Biographical note:

The Weston and Woodman family collection consists of materials related to Walter and Mary E. Weston Woodman, and their family:

Weston family: James Partelow Weston (b. 14 July 1815) was a Universalist Minister who graduated from Bowdoin College with two degrees in 1840 and 1843. He served as President of Westbrook Seminary (College) in the 1850s and then served as president of Lombard University in Galesburg, Illinois for a number of years. In 1841 James married Eliza Elden Woodman (b. 30 March 1816) and they had one child, a daughter, Mary Emeline Weston, born 25 January 1849 in Gardiner, Maine. Mary E. Weston married her second cousin, Walter Woodman, in 1883.

Woodman family: Walter Woodman was the son of Cyrus Woodman (1814-1889) and Charlotte Flint (1814-1828). Walter graduated from Harvard in 1875 and Harvard Medical School in 1883. After practicing medicine for only one year in Alfred Maine, he left the profession due to ill health. Walter Woodman married Mary E. Weston in 1883 and they had four children before Mary died in 1888. Their second child, Elizabeth Woodman, married Charles Henry Conrad Wright in 1914. A lifelong Unitarian, Elizabeth was active in the First Parish Church of Cambridge.

Wright family: Charles Henry Conrad Wright (1869-1957) was born in Chicago Illinois to Charles Henry Wright and Margaret B. Wright. He graduated from Harvard in 1891 and Trinity College/Oxford University in 1895; he became a Professor of French Language and Literature at Harvard. In 1914 he married Elizabeth Woodman and together they had three sons: Walter Woodman Wright, C. Conrad Wright and Brooks Wright. Walter Woodman Wright also graduated from Harvard, in 1937, and went on to attend Columbia University School of Library Science. He worked as a Librarian at Harvard College, Ohio University, and Dartmouth, as well as the Harvard Club of New York, Johns Hopkins, and Penn State. In 1941 he married a Norwegian woman, Aagot Horn (1915-2008), a fellow student at Columbia School of Library Science. Upon Walter's death in 1995, his wife Aagot donated the family collection to the Maine Historical Society.

There is also a collection of Stone, Silsbee, and Johnson family letters, which may be connected to the Weston and Woodman family. It includes letters to Mary Silsbee from Thomas and Laura

Stone. Thomas Treadwell Stone (1801-1895) was an American Unitarian pastor, abolitionist, and Transcendentalist.

Scope and Content note: Scrapbooks, diaries, school compositions, autograph books, diplomas, deeds, correspondence, and bound ledgers.

Processing note: Since this collection has been in backlog since 1997, it's possible that the collection may have been confused in the almost 20 years before being processed. We can't find a connection between the original donation (see source file) and the Silsbee family letters, and the bound ledgers of medical information. The bound ledges, especially, may not be part of the original collection.

Series I and II: the Weston family collection and the deeds – can be linked to the original gift in 1997 (1997.391) but the others cannot. By 2015 they were marked as being with the collection, but there is no documentation about series.

Series:

Series I: Weston and Woodman family papers and memorabilia (Box 1, and Oversized Boxes 1 and 2)

Series II: Washington County deeds, 1821-1849 (Box 2)

Series III: Correspondence of Samuel and Mary Silsbee and Samuel Johnson, 1832-1849 (Box 2) Series IV: Ledgers of infectious diseases and epidemiology statistics and graphs, 1911 - 1963 (Box 2, and Oversized Box 2)

Series I: Weston-Woodman family papers and memorabilia including a scrapbook and diary of Eliza E. Woodman Weston, and school compositions written by Mary E. Weston and scrapbooks, autograph books and a college diploma for Mary E. Weston. A series of children's books from the mid nineteenth century, belonging to Mary E. Weston, is now cataloged separately in the Library stacks (an author search under *Woodman, Mary E.* in Minerva will bring up the books owned by her).

Series II: Washington County property deeds includes a number of property deeds and legal paperwork related from 1821-1849. Both purchasers and sellers for these properties as well as the legal signatures noted on the deeds are not known family members in the Weston, Woodman or Wright families.

Series III: Correspondence of Samuel and Mary Silsbee, Samuel and Mary Anne Johnson, and Thomas and Laura Stone, 1832-1849. Included in this category are letters from Pastor Thomas Stone and his wife Laura Stone to the Silsbees. Thomas Stone was a Unitarian Minister who was from Maine and attended Bridgton Academy in Maine and then was the President of Bridgton Academy, where one of his students could have been James P. Weston. At the time of these letters he was in East Machias, Maine, writing as "your pastor" to Samuel and Mary Silsbee. From 1832 to 1846 Stone and his family resided in East Machias, Maine, where he was pastor of the Union Church. The letters from Samuel Silsbee were written while a student at Bowdoin College.

Series IV: Infectious diseases and epidemiological statistics and graphs which includes loose and bound ledgers of graphs and statistics about the incidence of certain infectious diseases in Maine from 1911-1963. There is no mention of who collected this data and tabulated the graphs.

In Museum: Objects and memorabilia related to Series I: Handkerchief with James P. Weston's autograph Signal Flag from Walter Woodman's private Yacht "Dorothy Q"
